Announcements (continued)	 Kansas Arts Commission Grants – The Kansas Arts Commission is no longer a state-funded organization. Dr. John Taylor stated that NEA may help the Kansas Arts Commission with some federal money, so the organization may be giving some
	 grants, but KMEA is not counting on receiving any money. ISW 2012 – Scott Schuler, MENC President, will attend the KMEA In-Service Workshop and will speak on the opening session.
	Vice-President Mike Quilling said that KMEA always works ahead to ensure that the MENC President is a part of our February convention. Mr. Quilling also announced that the Thursday evening President's Concert would be entitled, "Music for Life", and would feature community groups who highlight how music skills are being used outside of the classroom. These groups include Zing!, a women's barbershop quartet, the KU Trombone Ensemble, performers of all ages from the Lawrence area, and the Beloit Community Orchestra.
	 MENC Music in Washington Week – The KMEA Executive Board will attend Music in Washington Week. This replaces the bi- annual National MENC Conventions of the past. Highlights of the MENC Music in Washington Week include the MENC National Honor Ensembles, MENC Academies, and visits with legistalors.
	 MENC National Honor Ensembles – KMEA encourages directors to get their students involved. Last year, Kansas had four students participate. This year, Kansas has three students. The students participating in the National Honor
	Choir are Ashton Lee and Madison Moore, students of Beth Novotny from Pratt-Skyline High School. Ashton Lee is the granddaughter of Bob Lee, KMR Advertising Manager. Adam Galigher, student of Kathleen McCullough (KASTA President) from Blue Valley Northwest High School, will be
	participating in the National Honor Orchestra. KASTA President Kathleen McCullough explained that the online audition process is still confusing. Students have to be nominated by an MENC member for the ensemble, but
	sometimes the students have been contacted with the news of their acceptance rather than the teachers. Ms. McCullough felt that it would be better for the nominating director to be given this information first. Dr. John Taylor said that he
	would bring this concern to MENC National. He also



	 encouraged affiliate presidents to push the National Honor Ensembles with their organizations. Kathleen McCullough agreed that these ensembles should be advertised more. She said that there is another ASTA National Honor Orchestra group with the same acronym that could be confusing to directors. Dr. Taylor reminded the board that auditions are due even before All-State, so the students must begin working on the music early in the year. Vice-President Mike said that he encourages MENC to reduce the price. Dr. John Taylor stated that KMEA voted to help students attend by paying a portion of the cost. 2) MENC Academies – Another part of MENC Music in Washington Week is the Academies. Vice-President Mike has been involved in National Assembly meetings at the same time, so he has been unable to attend one of the academies. Dr. Taylor explained that the academies are like going to a two day workshop with a specific focus and clinician. A person would spend the entire time at one academy. The academies have not been very well attended yet. Vice-President Mike said that it would be a great opportunity to learn and spend time with a great clinician. Dr. John Taylor, KMEA Executive Director and SW Division President-Elect, is encouraging MENC to create one or two more academies with the best clinicians MENC can find and attach the academies to the state conventions. Vice- President Mike Quilling stated that it is nice to have Dr. Taylor to represent Kansas on the National Executive Board. 3) Visits with Kansas Legislators – At Music in Washington Week, the KMEA Executive Board will have the opportunity to meet with Kansas Legislators. President Craig Manteuffel is already working to schedule the Executive Board to meet with Kansas Senators and their staff in Washington. Vice- President Mike noted that it is just as helpful to meet with the Senators' staff because they are the writers of the legislation.
IV. KMEA Board Reports a. Executive Council	 President, Craig Manteuffel – Report stands as written. Vice- President Mike Quilling commended President Craig for doing a great job with the Strategic Planning Meeting. KMEA has clear direction from Craig for the next two years. President Craig shared through Skype that he has consulted with Dr. Taylor and Patrick Neas, Program Director/Morning Show Host, of Radio Bach, Kansas City. KMEA will receive twenty-five percent of all sales of an e-cookbook that Radio Bach will be writing and selling on Amazon. President Craig will have more information to share at the August Board Meeting. Vice-President Mike Quilling shared that Craig MENC has had some Advocacy Webinars to train state

At this time, the board watched Jay Prater's public service announcement on the benefits of music and music education. This PSA has run approximately 500 times around news times in the Wichita area. Vice-President Mike encouraged President-Elect Avian Bear to check into the costs to have this PSA run in the Kansas City area.
	• President-Elect, Avian Bear – Report stands as written. Avian announced the following as the 2014-2015 State Chairs: Martha Barnhill-Orchestra, Damian Johnson-1-4A Band, Justin Love-5-6A Band, Ben Rohrer-Jazz Band, and Jennifer Donovan-Elementary. Jane Vanderhoff is the High School Choir Assistant Chair. Avian is still working to find someone to serve as Middle Level Choir Chair.
	• Vice President, Mike Quilling – Report stands as written. His report highlights his travels since the February ISW Board Meeting. He was able to attend Arts Day at the Capitol in March. Also attending Arts Day at the Capitol were Lori Supinie, KMMA Liaison, and Susanna Kingsley, Mrs. Kansas, and it was a great help for KMEA to have them there.
	• Executive Director, John Taylor – Dr. John Taylor has closed out the 2011 ISW financial for contracts, and all bills have been paid. All clinicians and conductors for the 2012 ISW have been booked. The 2012 conductors are David Brunner, Middle Level Choir, Ralph Ford, 1-4A Band, Peter Boonshaft, 56A Band, Kenneth Fulton, High School Choir, Jung-Ho Pak, Orchestra, and Steve Owen, Jazz. Dr. Taylor commended the state chairs for doing such a good job this year. Holly Taylor, Elementary Chair, has been successful in finding outside funding for clinicians when necessary. KMEA will end the year with money in the bank. KMEA will most likely be able to put money into the KMEA Fund before the end of the fiscal year. Dr. Taylor will give the Financial Report at the August Board Meeting. Dr. Taylor has hired Dr. Catherine Hunt, from Washburn University, to be the KMR Editor and Dana Hamant, from Wichita East High School, to be ISW Exhibits Manager. He asked that the board make sure to thank Harold Popp and Don Corbett for their years of service. Dr. Taylor will be attending MENC meetings in Washington, D.C. and Dallas this summer. MENC will pay for him to attend, which saves KMEA money. Dr. Taylor has been working to organize the Executive Directors of each district in Kansas, and he has established two annual meetings with them. The first will take place at 10:00 on Friday of the August Board Meeting. District Presidents are welcome to attend. KMEA's accountant, Lindsey Smith, will also attend. The accountant will now be reviewing all districts' books, and all districts now operate on a July 1-June 30 fiscal year. The District Executive Directors should be presenting some information at the August Board Meeting. Vice-President Mike Quilling noted that this has been done to help the Districts, not to make them feel like the State is telling them what to do. Dr. Taylor finished his report by asking the board to look at the list of KMEA employees in his report and make sure to thank them for their work.
IV.b – District Presidents	 NE District, Laura VanLeeuwen – Report stands as written. The NE District Board meeting is planned for Tuesday, June 7, 2011. She noted the District audition and Mini-Convention dates. She was pleased that their vertical site format was working very well for their mini convention. The District President, Vice-President, and President-Elect are each at one of the sites. She also noted that Jack Ballard was inducted into the KMEA Hall of Fame and Dwayne Dunn was awarded the Kansas Music Teacher of the year in February. Vice-President Mike Quilling added that he attended the NE District mini-convention last year and they were amazing hosts. The convention was very well organized. SE District, Gae Phillips – Report stands as written. The SE District board would be meeting June 10 to get organized for the next year. She also added that Mark Gard was the SE District President-Elect. NC District, Matt Bradford – Report stands as written. The NC District Board meeting is scheduled for July 19, 2011. Matt has stepped into the role of NC District President again after Quentin Breese accepted a school administrative position. Matt said that he is more than happy to serve in this capacity as long as he is needed. SC District, Gretchen Bixler – Gretchen noted one amendment to her report. The deadline for HS District Honor Band/Orchestra/Choir registration for auditions would be October 15, 2011 instead of October 7. Gretchen also added that the High School Jazz clinicians would be Frederick Burrack and Gary Zeek. Shawn Knopp has accepted the appointment to SC District President-Elect after Melissa Watkins resigned from the office. She is moving. NW District, Kathy Dreiling-Amrein – Report stands as written. The NB District Board meeting will be on July 28, 2011. She added that Vesta Jo Still is the NW District President-Elect as well as the High School Choir chair.

IV.c- Kansas CMENC President	 CMENC President, Emily Foerschler – Since taking office, Emily has met with Lori Supinie at Senseney Music to organize the 2012 KCOMTEP conference. Clinicians include Debra Hedden, to speak about interviewing tips, and Reggie Romine, KSHSAA Consultant, to speak on advocacy. They are still working on a Monday clinician. Emily noted that communication has been a problem since taking office in February. She has been frustrated with the lack of response she has gotten from some CMENC Chapter Advisors. Due to this, she is unsure of numbers of students who may attend the MENC SW Division Symposium in Dallas. She was excited to know that KMEA would be providing help with transportation costs to attend the Symposium. Emily hopes to establish a student contact lists for CMENC members for more direct communication. She also hopes to increase the number of active CMENC chapters participating in the CMENC board meetings. Vice-President Mike Quilling noted that the CMENC President's term is only one year long which makes it challenging to get everything done.

It is difficult to determine who is receiving the necessary emails and who is not. Troy is currently setting up Wiki for communication and file sharing for the executive committee and group chairs. Troy has also agreed to work on the online version of the KMR. 	• Kansas Orff President, Vicky Artzer – Report stands as written. Vicky shared that the organization's challenge is to maintain membership. Most meetings tend to be held in the eastern part of the state, so they are working to reach out to the western portion of Kansas. The organization's goal is to increase membership. Vice- President Mike Quilling said that he appreciates that the Kansas affiliate organizations are so strong. He commended them for providing a variety of clinic sessions that are what KMEA members need.
	 Festival Committee, Dana Hamant – Dana noted that Solo and Ensemble rubric adjudication forms were approved by KSHSAA and will be used beginning next April. There are quite a few people to replace on the festival committee—some due to not attending meetings and some simply because they have finished serving their three years. Dana added that discussions will happen about allowing more students to participate at Large Group festival and Solo and Ensemble Festival. They will also be looking at the current rule excluding duets from festival. Because there is quality literature out there for String duets, it seems like this rule is more viable for the other instruments. KASTA President Kathleen McCullough brought up the concern that many more band students can be taken to festival. A strings room was cut at both Regional and State Festival. Dana stated that this was most likely due to money and lack of judges. Kathleen McCullough offered some suggestions for the festivals committee such as looking at a percentage allocation of students based on the size of each school's program and looking at how many schools actually take their allotted number of students. Vice-President Mike Quilling said that President Craig Manteuffel would direct the festival committee on this issue as it is a worthy concern to discuss. Next, Greg Bontrager brought up the issue of looking at Regional and State Solo and Ensemble Festival. Large

Group Festival was reduced to just State Large Group, and he wondered at what point KMEA should look at just having a State Solo and Ensemble Festival to save money. Dana explained that music is about the only thing that KSHSAA loses money on, but the IV.f- Affiliate point is participation. He also explained that it was not money Organizations issues that caused the need to eliminate Regional Large Group (continued) festival. Festival locations are determined by school size (1A-6A), not by location. One problem is the increased cost of students driving across the state. Vice-President Mike Quilling expressed concern about going to administrators and giving them a place to cut when they are already looking for places to cut. He also noted that his students in a small school get very excited to travel across the state for festival. Greg Bontrager clarified that the issue was eliminating Regional festival and just having one State solo and ensemble festival. He also noted that while it is big for students to travel across the state, in his experience, his students perform better for Regional festival than State festival anyway. Vice-President Mike Quilling stated that it was up to President Craig Manteuffel to decide whether to direct the festivals committee to do more research on this issue. Mr. Quilling concluded with a reminder that it is important for board members wearing red ribbons at the ISW to speak with exhibitors and thank them for being there. Festival Ensembles, Randy Fillmore - Randy informed the board • that he would be sending out the deadline dates for registration for auditions. The Contingency plan is as follows: January 7, 2012 auditions at Salina Central; January 14, 2012 is the back-up audition date in case of inclement weather; the 3rd audition date is a more involved process with sending in audition tapes. Randy added that there is no sight reading for orchestra auditions and that there is no rule for audition material to be memorized. Randy then introduced the festival chairs: Craig Gray, 5-6A Band, Larry Brownlee, 1-4A Band, Mike Jones, Jazz, Jeffrey Bishop, Orchestra, Deb Hill, Middle Level Choir, and Dwayne Dunn, Choir. Vice-President Mike said that these chairs have a great opportunity to work with the clinicians that come to the ISW. Next, Randy gave an update on rehearsal facilities for the festival chairs. The 1234A Band would be at the Broadview Hotel, as it has been renovated and will be open by the 2012 ISW. All other festival ensembles will remain in the same rehearsal locations as 2011. Craig Gray, 56A Band Chair, offered that his district would be willing to provide a shuttle bus for students between the Metropolitan Baptist church and Century II. Dr. John Taylor said that he would work out the times that the shuttle bus is needed. President Craig Manteuffel asked that the board give a round of applause to the festival chairs for all their work. Vice President Mike then asked for an update on how results for live

Since the June Board meeting, I have the following items to report.

1. In June, I attended the MENC Southwestern Division Symposium in Dallas and the MENC NEB and National Assembly in Arlington, Virginia. In August, I attended the Southwestern Division Board meeting in Wichita. Since I am now a member of the National Executive Board, my expenses for MENC meetings are covered by MENC and not KMEA.

2. The fiscal year ended on June 30. The books for the fiscal year 2010-2011 have been reviewed by our CPA, and found to have been completed with appropriate accounting procedures. We finished the year with a small surplus due to several fee increases that the KMEA Board approved for the 2010-11 fiscal year. A complete financial report for fiscal 2010-2011 will be given during this Board meeting. I request approval of that report.

3. I continue to work with the District Executive Directors to organize our efforts. For the first time, KMEA Districts have had their books reviewed and will be filing all IRS financial reports. Five of the six Districts participated this year. Five of the six Executives will be meeting with our CPA before the Board meeting starts on August 5. We will use this opportunity to improve our reporting processes for the 2011-12 fiscal year and to discuss operational procedures. The Executives can present a review of their books to the District Boards. Our report to the IRS will now include all State and District funds under one umbrella and one EIN not-for-profit number. This past December, I completed 1099s for the State and for the Districts. W9s are being completed for all State and District salaried and fee transactions (both income and expenses). I will be hosting 2 annual meetings with the District Executives – one before the August KMEA Board meeting and one on Thursday evening of the ISW in February.

4. All facilities booking for the 2012 ISW is completed, including booking for the Garvey Center and the Metropolitan Baptist Church. The Broadview Hotel will be open for the 2012 ISW with only one ballroom rehearsal facility. I have signed a contract with the new Marriott Fairfield Inn for a block of guest rooms. I will be contracting buses to transport students from the Metropolitan Church and trolleys to transport convention attendees to various convention facilities and to Old Town during the lunch and dinner hours.

5. Contracting for guest artists and clinicians for the 2012 and 2013 ISWs is complete (some final paperwork is being secured). President-Elect Avian Bear has completed her appointments of Assistant Chairs, and I have begun to work with these Assistants to book for 2014 and 2015. I have asked them to select their guest artists and clinicians by December 2011 and I hope to have them booked by August 2012.

6. The Kansas Arts Commission Grants continue to be at risk. However, the Commission has reorganized with a new Director. A meeting was held in July (while I was out of town) to provide more information about the new organization. KMEA completed paperwork for a 2011-12 Operations Grant. I do not currently know the status of this grant.



8. Our KMEA employees continue to do excellent work. We have several new employees in place for the 2011-12 fiscal year, and I am excited about the new ideas they will bring to our organization. As members of the KMEA Board, please take time to thank our employees for their service when the opportunity presents itself.

- ** The web-based version of the Kansas Music Review is making steady progress. Completed components include the page template, dynamic page rendering, and software for managing advertisements in the site. The site is essentially ready for the Fall 2011 issue; however, further work needs to be done for back-end administrative control of articles and issues. We'll continue to make improvements to the site even after it is launched.
- ** Following discussion in June, I've researched email list services to find a replacement for PHP-List. I reviewed Constant Contact, Patron Mail, and iContact. iContact offers a "Free Edition" level for subscriber lists below 500. I signed myself up and tinkered with the interface. It was very easy to navigate and I was quickly "broadcasting" to a sample list. Should we go to a paid service, my recommendation is iContact. I'll have a cost breakdown hand-out at the meeting.
- ** There have been discussions in the past about adopting a separate email service for KMEA for selected personnel. I've reviewed two solutions:
 - Microsoft Live@Edu built on the MSN/Hotmail platform. Although it is free, I'm not completely enamored with it. The interface relies heavily on pop-up windows, and as with just about any free service, you get what you pay for. Additionally, in testing Live@Edu, it was not able to transmit to my KMEA alias webmaster@ksmea.org. Based on this problem, I cannot recommend this service.
 - Rackspace Apps a paid service which we use in my district, so I can personally attest to its quality. Standard price is \$2/box/month. Non-profits get a 20% discount, so cost to KMEA would be \$1.80/box/month. Rackspace Apps includes email, contact management, group lists, aliases, shared calendars, task lists, and a notepad app. It is web-based and comes with mobile device apps for access anywhere.
- ** The Clinics Proposal Manager has had some upgrades completed. The proposal database is now searchable, and the individual proposal printed screen includes scheduling checkboxes to facilitate ISW planning. Two new searchable fields have been added: "Year Proposed" and "Year Presented." This will allow us to track proposals over multiple years for past reference.
- ** Most instances of "State Festival Groups" have been changed to "All-State Groups" around the website. The renamed All-State Manager has been rolled over to the 2011-2012 school year and is essentially ready for choral registration. There is very little programming needed to launch registration this year.
- ** The new Performance Repertoire Report is making steady progress. Launch date is Dec. 1st.
- ** The Wiki project remains on the back burner for now. I'll try to continue it this fall after honor group registration calms down.

Rules and Regulations For All Parties Involved in KMEA Festival Groups

To help clarify qualifications and responsibilities for all parties concerned with each year's KMEA Festival Groups, the following rules and regulations were adopted by the KMEA Board of Directors, September 5, 1986 and revised by the Board of Directors, August 24, 2002, June, 2005, August 4, 2007, and August 6, 2011.

The KMEA Board can approve or disapprove the appointments.

The Festival Chairpersons have the authority to:

- 1. organize the festival groups that will perform at the annual KMEA In-Service Workshop, which will include securing the services of clinicians each year;
- 2. organize the audition selection committee to select the participants in festival groups;
- 3. determine the number of students who will be eligible to participate in the festival groups each year; (Recommended guideline should be approximately a 100 piece band, 100 piece orchestra 250 voice choir, and jazz determined by arrangement)
- 4. work coordinately with festival group clinicians to select music for the KMEA In-Service Workshop;
- 5. supply the needed information to secure all equipment pertaining to the performances of any given year, for example, stands, percussion equipment, etc.;
- 6. organize an audition committee for the purpose of final seating at the KMEA In-Service Workshop; and,
- 7. host and supervise festival group rehearsals and performances at the KMEA In-Service Workshop.

Each school will be responsible for the supervision, conduct, and behavior of its students during the entire KMEA In-Service Workshop.

KMEA Responsibilities

All instrumental woodwind, brass, strings and percussion students who participate in the instrumental festival groups at the District Mini-Conventions are eligible to audition for any KMEA instrumental festival group. The student will participate in all rehearsals and the concert for the KMEA In-Service Workshop.

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District Responsibilities

Each district:

- 1. will determine its own policy on auditions for district level performances;
- 2. will supply an eligibility list to the chairperson for choir, band, orchestra, and jazz band immediately;
- will host and supervise district festival group rehearsals and the performances at the District Mini-Conventions. <u>Each School</u> will be responsible for the supervision, conduct, and behavior of its students during the Mini-Conventions and during the entire KMEA In-Service Workshop.
- 4. will not allow students to audition, participate, or be selected to both the choir and instrumental groups; and,
- 5. will be responsible for providing to the teachers in the district, information (rules, regulations, and guidelines) concerning district and KMEA festival groups.

School Responsibilities

Each School:

- 1. will be a member of the KSHSAA and be in good standing with the organization;
- 2. will be eligible to enter students as determined in the rules and guidelines established by each KMEA District;
- 3. will not allow students to audition for both KMEA festival choir and KMEA festival instrumental groups. All instrumental woodwind, brass, and percussion students who participated in the instrumental festival groups at the District Mini-Conventions are eligible to audition for any KMEA Instrumental festival group; and,
- 4. will be responsible for the supervision, conduct, and behavior of its students during the entire KMEA In-Service Workshop.

Student Responsibilities

Each student:

- 1. will be in good standing according to the rules and guidelines for participation established by the KSHSAA and the resident school;
- 2. must be a sophomore, junior, or senior in high school;
- 3. vocalist must be enrolled in a choral performance area, if one exists in the school, at the time of auditions; and the student must be enrolled in a choral performance area, if one exists in the school, at the time of the KMEA In-Service Workshop;
- 4. instrumentalist must be enrolled in an instrumental performance area, if one exists in the school, at the time of auditions; and the student must be enrolled in an instrumental performance area, if one exist in the school, at the time of the KMEA In-Service Workshop;
- 5. will audition for the festival groups according to the rules and guidelines established by the KMEA Board; and,
- 6. will participate in all rehearsals and the concert for the District Mini-Convention.



Membership limitations and privileges:

- to participate in a State Wide an All-State Festival Ensemble, the student must be a sophomore, junior, or senior in high school.
- freshmen are not eligible to audition for or to participate in high school State Wide All-State Festival Ensembles.
- a vocalist selected as a participant in the State Wide All-State Festival Choir cannot audition for or be a member of a State-Wide All-State instrumental ensemble.
- an instrumentalist selected as a participant in the State Wide All-State Festival orchestra, jazz ensemble or concert bands cannot be a member of a State Wide All-State vocal ensemble.
- band students from 1A, 2A, 3A and 4A schools may only audition for the 1234A State-Wide All-State Band.
- band students from 5A and 6A schools may only audition for the 56A State Wide All-State Band.
- instrumentalist from all six KSHSAA classifications may be members of the State Wide All-State Jazz Ensemble and the State-Wide All-State Orchestra
- virtual school students must meet KSHSAA eligibility guidelines for participation in a KMEA State-Wide All-State Festival Ensemble. This includes attendance requirements at a KSHSAA approved school.
- home schooled students must meet KSHSAA eligibility guidelines for participation in a KMEA State-Wide All-State Festival Ensemble. This includes attendance requirements at a KSHSAA approved school.

Any instrumentalist who meets all of their KMEA District's eligibility and participation requirements may audition for any instrumental State Wide All-State Festival Ensemble, with the exception of limitations for 1234A and the 56A bands as stated above.

***<u>Exception</u>: Any student involved in individual school performances for the KMEA In-Service Workshop will be excused from rehearsal <u>one hour prior</u> to the school performance and return to the rehearsal <u>thirty minutes following</u> the completion of the school performance.

*******<u>Exception</u>: Any exception or any absence due to an emergency conflict that will affect the rehearsals or performance of the festival groups at the KMEA In-Service Workshop must be approved by the KMEA Festival Chairperson.

*******<u>Exception:</u> Any absence due to an emergency conflict that will affect the rehearsals or performance at the District Mini-Convention must be approved by the District Chairperson and District President. (Note: SAT and ACT Tests are not regarded as emergency conflicts; however, a student may be excused for the SAT English Competency Test upon prior notification of the District Chairperson and the District President).

*******<u>Exception</u>: The KMEA Board authorizes the release of varsity basketball players from the state festival rehearsals to participate in their 1A Regional basketball tournament. This policy will be in effect for both boys and girls. Players' participation must be verified by their school's Administrator and they must be listed on the official KSHSAA roster form for the tournament. The school's Administrator will send a copy of the official KSHSAA tournament roster form to the Festival Ensemble Manager.



While no restriction on absence time has been indicated, the student MUST be all KMEA rehearsals as much as absolutely possible. *"KMEA recognizes the importance of the students to their community and school events but will not tolerate apparent abuse of this policy. The appearance of abuse may lead to reconsideration of this policy on the part of KMEA. KMEA WILL take precedence on Saturday and release for 1A regional basketball WILL NOT be considered."*

Prior to the first KMEA Festival Ensembles rehearsal, the Festival Ensemble Manager will provide the State Festival Chairpersons a list of students to be excused.

***<u>Exemption</u>: Students Selected for the <u>MENC</u> NAfME - U.S. Army Marching Band

Instrumentalist selected to perform with the MENC NAFME - U.S. Army Marching Band will receive a special exemption from attendance at the KMEA State-Wide Ensemble Live Instrumental Auditions. The instrumentalist will be allowed to make a single CD recording of the required audition materials with the Festival Ensembles manager.

Requirements:

- The instrumentalist must have fulfilled all District requirements for eligibility regarding membership in a State-Wide Ensemble
- The instrumentalist's director must have submitted an audition form
- The instrumentalist's director will contact the Festival Ensembles manager by December 10^{th} in order to establish a date and time for the recording session
- The recording must be completed prior to the instrumentalist's departure for participation in the U.S. Army Marching Band
- The audition materials will include:
 - The required scale(s)
 - Sight-reading
 - The entire etudes, solo, or studies as listed on the KMEA website
- The instrumentalist will be given adequate warm-up time and will indicate when he/she is ready to record.
- The instrumentalist will make a single recording of the required audition materials.
- Once the recording session begins, the Festival Manager will pause the CD for one minute between the scale(s), sight-reading, and each major section of the solo/etude passages (since they are having to record the full audition materials)
- When the CD is played for the judges at the live auditions, the judges will hear only the scale(s), sight-reading, and the same sections of the solo/etudes performed by students auditioning at the live-audition session
- The recording session will be held at Lawrence Free State High School



Contingency Plan for 3rd State-Wide Instrumental Auditions

If the primary audition date and the contingency audition date are cancelled, the director will be asked to submit a separate CD recording of each audition.

- 1. Each audition must be recorded on an individual CD*
- 2. The CD must be labeled with the student's name, instrument, and school
- 3. A copy of the original entry form must be sent with each CD
- 4. The CD must include:
 - The designated Concert chromatic scale, the instrumentalist's full range, ascending
 - The designated etude/solo sections of the audition materials, as listed on the KMEA Auditions website
- 5. The etude/solo sections will be posted on the KMEA website by the ensembles chairperson. The ensemble chairpersons will post these musical selections following the cancellation of the primary audition date so directors may begin recording (in case the 2nd audition date is also cancelled)
- **6.** CD's must be postmarked by the Wednesday following the January 15th audition date. This year that time and date would be 11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, January 19, 2011.
- 7. The CD must be mailed to the appropriate chairperson by priority mail.
- 8. The festival ensemble chairperson(s) will assemble a group of directors to listen to the CD's on the first Saturday in February.
- 9. Results will be posted on the KMEA website within three days of the CD listening sessions.
- * On the recording, the scale must be recorded first and the etude second.
 - 1. The pause button of the recorder may be used between the scale and the etude.
 - 2. The pause should not exceed one minute in time.
 - 3. The recording may not be modified, spliced, edited, computer corrected, or computer enhanced.
 - 4. There should be NO TALKING on the recording.



5. Music Advocacy Network Protocol

Hierarchy of communication

- 1. A KMEA member enacts the Music Advocacy Network through an email describing the advocacy support need: advocacy@ksmea.org
- 2. The KMEA advocacy chair communicates the need to the KMEA president and discusses communication options: president@ksmea.org
- 3. The KMEA president contacts music teacher to approve the communication plan and then contacts the advocate indicating the need, type of contact, and the message to be delivered.
- 4. The KMEA president communicates the advocacy effort to the appropriate district president and the KMEA advocacy chair communicated the advocacy effort to the appropriate district advocacy chair.
- 5. The district advocacy chair and district president maintains contact with the director followed with communication of resulting actions to the KMEA president and advocacy chair.
- 6. The advocacy chair maintains a record of all actions taken for future reference.
- 7. The KMEA president sends appreciative communication to the advocate.

Project objectives and policy for content of response

The primary objective is to assist music programs and their instructors with maintaining quality music education in schools. The content of all communications must be approved by the KMEA president who is responsible to follow all KMEA and MENC policies. It is essential that the music instructor is involved with all communication to district constituents, so the instructor must provide final approval as to what is communicated, to whom the communication should be focused, and when the communication will occur. The district president will forward all communication to the KMEA Advocacy chair and all district Advocacy chairs.

Assessment plan for project success

All records of communication will be maintained by the KMEA Advocacy chair and reported annually to the KMEA Leadership.

6. Plan for communication to KMEA members

A summary of activities will be reported to the membership by the KMEA Advocacy chair in the KMR advocacy report, taking care for confidentiality.
